AAUW NATIONAL CONVENTION - IT WAS AWESOME!

There is no way I can capture, in one newsletter article, the amazing experience of attending the AAUW National Convention, June 14-17 in Washington D.C. My overwhelming feeling is that I am so proud to be a member of AAUW because of the tremendous impact our mission has on the lives of women and girls. Below is a summary of the highlights.

- Lobby Day was exhausting and exhilarating. 600+ AAUW members stormed Capitol Hill in white t-shirts to meet with Senators and Congressmen. <u>Read</u> about the Pennsylvania delegation experience and our Senator Toomey sighting.
- Impressive guest speakers shared insights and perspectives. Judy Woodruff (Coanchor and Managing Editor, PBS NewsHour), Linda DiVall (Founder of American Viewpoint, first Republican woman to launch a political survey firm) and Celinda Lake (Founder of Lake Research Partners).
- The value and impact of AAUW was expressed by three women sharing their stories of attending a Work Smart workshop; member of the Student Advisory Council; assistance from Legal Advocacy Fund that changed the momentum of her Title IX case.
- Plenty of workshops, yielding lots of good ideas. The AAUW Annual Meeting gave me a better understanding of our organization and how we get things done.

- Many opportunities to hear from our new CEO, Kim Churches. Did you know the average age of AAUW members is 72? She is the right person to work with the Board to make changes so natural member attrition doesn't collapse AAUW. Here is a video introduction.
- Truly inspirational speech by Tererai Trent, Ph.D., the 2017 AAUW Alumnae Recognition Awardee.
 Read her story and how the AAUW fellowship arrived at a most pivotal time of her life. Tearing up just thinking about her.
- From sexual assault to becoming a nationally recognized victim rights attorney is the powerful story of <u>Laura Dunn</u>, <u>J.D.</u>, the 2017 Eleanor Roosevelt Fund Awardee.
- Shaking hands with Justice Sonia Sotomayor as she glided between 80 tables while answering questions about her experiences.

The next AAUW Annual Convention is in 2020 (yes, a change from biannual routine) to celebrate the 100th anniversary of American women winning the right to vote. I'm going!

COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS

We supported AAUW of Pennsylvania on Wednesday, July 19 at a town hall-style event to discuss women's health and economic security in Pennsylvania. The event took place in Carlisle as part of Community Conversations on Pregnancy, Parenthood, and Women's Health, a statewide series of public conversations organized by the Pennsylvania Campaign for Women's Health coalition, of which AAUW-PA is a member.

Thanks to Linda Figueroa for coordinating our team and to Virginia Mueller, Carolyn Freberg, Gail D'Urso and Doreen Barringer for working the event.

The conversation was hosted by Dr. Chavone Momon-Nelson, a board certified OB/GYN. This event provided a great opportunity for members to talk with others in the community about the issues that matter most to Pennsylvania women and families.

WHAT DOES AAUW NATIONAL MEMBERSHIP PROVIDE?

When paying your AAUW national dues do you ever wonder what the dues provide for its members? Your national dues join with the dues of thousands of other like minded members to enable AAUW to be the face that empowers women and girls. The mission statement of AAUW is to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research. What does this mean to you? Are you proud to a member of an organization that contributes to empowering females across the world?

AAUW provides resources so that members can advocate for legislative changes at the state and national level. Becoming an "AAUW Two Minute Activist" will allow you to respond quickly to Congress on issues that affect women and girls.

Our national organization equips members with professional looking videos and talking points that can be upload on social media. This method of communication is a trendy way to make people aware of the issues facing women and girls.

AAUW is also working on protecting Title IX. National provided resources for our branch to distribute to the local school district's Title IX coordinators. The "Legal Advocacy Fund" is a program sponsored by AAUW to provide

funds and support in discrimination cases that protect the rights of women in the workplace and college campus. You many think Title IX is just about sports, it isn't!

Did you know that bullying and sexually harassment is a violation of Title IX because it creates an inequitable learning environment?

Starting in 1922, AAUW has had a long history in fighting to end wage discrimination against Wage women. inequalities are not simply a result of women's qualifications or choices. Wage discrimination persists despite women's increased educational levels and experience along with decreased amount of time spent out of the workforce raising children. The Carlisle branch offered the "Work Smart Salary Negotiation Program" developed by AAUW to help women reach wage equality.

These are just a few of the programs and resources developed and provided with our national dues. Maybe these issues are not ones that affect you but do affect our daughters, granddaughters and females of all ages in our neighborhood.
