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### MOZAMBIQUE GIRLS EDUCATION PROJECT

The speaker for our <u>January 23<sup>rd</sup></u> branch meeting is Priscilla Laws, Dickinson College Professor Emerita in physics.

Ms. Laws completed requirements for her B.A. in Physics from Reed College in 1961 and her Ph.D. in nuclear theory from Bryn Mawr College in 1965. She then joined the Dickinson College faculty and focused her early research on the health effects of radiation. She then wrote two consumer books on medical x-rays. Since 1986 she has dedicated herself to the development of hands-on activities and computer software that enable introductory physics students to learn physics in collaborative groups without listening to formal lectures. She has received several national awards for educational innovation. In addition, she and other physics teachers have given workshops to promote the use of active learning methods in physics teaching throughout the U.S. and in 22 other countries.

Her talk on January 23<sup>rd</sup> will be about the Mozambique Girls Education Project sponsored by the Unitarian Universalists of the Cumberland Valley (UUCV). Shortly after she retired from teaching at Dickinson in 2002, Dr. Laws joined the UUCV congregation. A year or so later she visited Mozambique to learn more about the sustainable development work done by the son and daughter-in-law of fellow Dickinson colleagues. After her visit, Priscilla was contacted about the possibility of raising funds to support girls who wanted to attend a regional high school outside of their rural villages, and she thought that UUCV might be interested in sponsoring the project.

The Mozambique Bursary Project began in 2005 with 30 girls who had finished 8<sup>th</sup> grade in their home villages. The Project has grown and for the past ten years, between 90 and 120 girls have received support each year to attend secondary school. After finishing high school, several of the bursary girls who attended teaching programs at vocational schools are now teaching in primary schools in rural villages.

Molly Shane Program Chair On Saturday, <u>December 9th</u>, we welcome Dickinson's new president, Margee Ensign, to share "Education as a Force for Peace".

Margee Ensign became Dickinson's 29th president on July 1, 2017. Prior to Dickinson she served for seven years as the president of the American University of Nigeria (AUN), a young, private university focused on development, and based on the U.S model of university education. 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### **AAUW Carlisle Members Gather to Discuss Barriers & Bias**

On November 7<sup>th</sup>, AAUW Carlisle Public Policy Committee hosted Topic Talk, our second in a series of informal meetings for those interested in specific issues of the day. Our discussion topic for this event explored *Barriers and Bias: Women in Leadership*. We were fortunate to have as our discussion leader Dickinson College Assistant Professor Katie Oliviero. Dr. Oliviero's teaching and research specializations include transnational feminisms, immigration, QLGBT studies, critical race theory, law, social movements and cultural analysis. She is a recipient of a 2010 -2012 postdoctoral fellowship at Emory University School of Law. Between 2012 and 2014, Dr. Oliviero was an American Council of Learned Societies New Faculty Fellow at the University of Colorado, Women's and Gender Studies program and law school. She joined Dickinson's staff in 2014 in their Gender and Sexuality Studies Department. Dr. Oliviero received her B.A. degree from Dartmouth College in 2002, and M.A. for UCLA in 2007 and her Ph.D. in 2010.

Our discussion was based on information from several articles and short publications which attendees read prior to the meeting. We also discussed our results to AAUW's Implicit Association Test which each person participated in advance. First hand experiences were shared as we discussed the many challenges for women aspiring to become leaders in nearly every facet of American life from non-profits to the corporate world, from entry level minimum wage positions to the board room. Some points we considered included:

- Women currently earn more university level degrees than men and yet remain underrepresented in top positions
- Women make up more than half the population but under 30% of executive leaders
- Even worse when looking at women of color with only 4% of that population holding executive level positions
- Gender bias is cultural and exists in every aspect of American life including political, corporate and educational leadership opportunities
- Recent headlines that exploded into the "Me Too!" social media movement speaks to the need and desire to move our culture forward to a more fair and respectful place

Our discussion ended with a call to action to continue speaking out, encouraging women and working to change the culture and environment through political advocacy. We also agreed that our personal modeling with young children in our lives is especially important to this end.

An ocean away from Caroline, Kasia Kuzmerick, a Polish teenager, senses her carefree youth disappearing as she is drawn deeper into her role as courier for the underground resistance movement. In a tense atmosphere of watchful eyes and suspecting neighbors, one false move can have dire consequences.

For the ambitious young German doctor, Herta Oberheuser, an ad for a government medical position seems her ticket out of a desolate life. Once hired, though, she finds herself trapped in a male-dominated realm of Nazi secrets and power.

### **AAUW Glossary of Terms**

<u>College/University (C/U) Liaison, State and Branch</u> — A liaison appointed by AAUW-PA or a branch to work with a college or university to build programs and other ties of mutual interest and/or to encourage a non-participating college or university to become a C/U Member. The liaison can be particularly effective in communicating information about local activities and the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL).

<u>Community Action Grants (CAG) — National AAUW grants that provide seed money to branches, states, or individual women for research and projects that address education and equity for women and girls.</u>

<u>Connect2AAUW</u>—Responds to members' inquiries and requests for materials (800-326-AAUW (2289) M-F between 10 am - 5 pm ET). AAUW can be accessed on the web at <a href="http://www.aauw.org">http://www.aauw.org</a>. Email is <a href="mailto:connect@aauw.org">connect@aauw.org</a>.

<u>Convention</u>—A convention of AAUW may be held in the District of Columbia or such other place as may be designated by the Board of Directors. Written notice, or electronic notice if permitted by law, of the time and place of the meeting shall be sent to all members at least 30 days prior to the date of such meeting. The meeting shall include receipt of written reports on activities and the financial condition of AAUW and other appropriate business (AAUW Bylaws, Article XIII).
