INVOLUNTARY IMMIGRANT: A STORY OF REFUGE AND RESILIENCE

Samantha Jallah knows the power of an education. As the founder of Liberian Awards, a non-profit organization that mentors and serves immigrant and minority students, she strives to introduce youth to the pioneers who have gone before them and pair them with others who have used education to be successful. The organization also helps to financially support students and encourage them in their endeavors.

Her story, however, begins very differently. Born in Liberia, Samantha and her family were forced to flee a country torn by civil war. As refugees their journey led them to Ghana, Senegal and eventually United States. With the strong support of family members and many trials and errors, Samantha earned a degree in biology from California University of Pennsylvania followed by an MBA with a health care management concentration from American International University and a law degree from Penn State Dickinson School of Law. Her careers have been varied and her story of immigration is one of great interest in today's climate.

TITLE IX IN GRADES K-12: PUBLIC POLICY COMMITTEE HOPES TO SPUR A TOPIC TALK DISCUSSION!

A "Dear Colleague" letter from the Obama administration (U.S. Department of Education Office for Civil Rights, 2010) made it clear to schools that any harassment motivated by a student's gender is considered unlawful under Title IX. This guidance was subsequently eliminated under the current administration. What impact has this shift made from a practical standpoint for school administrators and from the perspective of young female students working on their educations in our local schools?

AAUW Carlisle's Topic Talk Program provides an opportunity for members and their guests to learn about and discuss specific public policy topics in a smaller group setting much like a book club discusses a book. Please join us for a discussion about Title IX in grades K through 12. Learn more about Title IX, the objectives and how it impacts our students, their teachers and administrators.

We are excited to have Christina Spielbauer as our Discussion Leader for this event. Spielbauer, who was recently appointed Superintendent of the Carlisle Area School District, has been dedicated to public education for more than 20 years. She began her career in the classroom as a middle school special education teacher gaining more and more responsibility throughout her career. She further serves the community as a volunteer in serval organizations to include working as a board member for the United Way of Carlisle and Cumberland County, the DREAM partnership (which provides post-secondary learning opportunities for Intellectually Disabled students to attend colleges and universities in Pennsylvania), Hope Station and the local chapter for Special Olympics. Ms. Spielbauer earned her Bachelor's Degree in elementary and special education from Duquesne University, her Master's Degree in Educational Leadership from Shippensburg University and her Superintendent's Letter of Eligibility from Shippensburg University.

CAMILLE BAUGHMAN

Continuing her career in social services, in the 1970s she worked for the Appalachian School of Experience on Hanover Street, an institution for adjudicated youth.

In the early 1980s, she took a life-changing trip to visit her sister in Boulder, CO, where she discovered the physical, spiritual and ethical benefits of massage therapy. In 1985 Camille received massage training in Florida, and began a career in massage therapy, eventually starting her own business. In addition, she teaches massage therapy, and has a position on the State Massage Licensing Board.

Camille loves the outdoors, and at the age of 50, hiked the Grand Canyon. She also hiked the Camino in Spain, a miles long spiritual journey as well as a cultural adventure enjoying the friendliness and hospitality of the Spanish people.

Having long admired the mission of AAUW, Camille visited the branch table at the Carlisle Barracks in October and signed up to become a member.

JENIFER JOHNSON

Jenifer is relatively new to the Carlisle area, having just moved two and a half years ago from Columbia, MD with her husband, George. Carlisle is their retirement home, where they live with their two cats, Gimli and Eowyn (Lord of the Rings fans will recognize these unusual names). Their grown daughter lives in Austin, TX.

1845: New York City is a sprawling warren of gaslit streets and crowded avenues, bustling with new immigrants and old money, optimism and opportunity, poverty and crime. Edgar Allan Poe's "The Raven" is all the rage—the success of which a struggling poet like Frances Osgood can only dream. As a mother trying to support two young children after her husband's cruel betrayal, Frances jumps at the chance to meet the illustrious Mr. Poe at a small literary gathering, if only to help her fledgling career. Although not a great fan of Poe's writing, she is nonetheless overwhelmed by his magnetic presence—and the surprising revelation that he admires her work.

What follows is a flirtation, then a seduction, then an illicit affair...and with each clandestine encounter, Frances finds herself falling slowly and inexorably under the spell of her mysterious, complicated lover. But when Edgar's frail wife, Virginia, insists on befriending Frances as well, the relationship becomes as dark and twisted as one of Poe's tales. And like those gothic heroines whose fates are forever sealed, Frances begins to fear that deceiving Mrs. Poe may be as impossible as cheating death itself...

AAUW Glossary of Terms

<u>Eleanor Roosevelt Fund</u>—The Eleanor Roosevelt Fund was established in 1989 and honors an individual, project, organization, or institution for outstanding contributions to equality and education for women and girls. The award is given for a broad range of activities including classroom teaching, education and research, and legal and legislative work in equality for women and girls. While the award focuses on education, the recipient need not be an educator.

<u>Fifty-year (Honorary) Life Member—</u>This status was granted by the 1959 Convention to any AAUW member who has been a member for 50 years. No state or national dues are paid; branches decide for themselves whether branch dues are paid.

<u>Give-A-Grad-A-Gift (GGG)</u>—AAUW members can give a free one-year AAUW membership to any graduate in the last year who has earned an associate, bachelor, or higher degree and who is not a regular member of AAUW. AAUW e-SAFs will automatically receive GGG upon graduation.

<u>IRS Annual Tax Return Form—</u>Every AAUW affiliate is required to file a federal tax return. The specific form depends on the annual gross receipts and will be either a 990-N (e-postcard), 990-EZ or 990 form.

<u>Issues—</u>Priority public policy issues for study and action.

Leadership and Programs Fund—part of AAUW Funds including NCCWSL, Campus Action Projects, and Campaign College.

<u>Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF)</u>—AAUW's LAF, a program of the AAUW Funds, provides funding and a support system for discrimination cases that protect women in all workplaces as well as those that arise in an academic context. Funds can be targeted specifically to case support, travel and education grants, and campus outreach programs. Learn_more at http://www.aauw.org/what-we-do/legal-resources.
