

A Look Backward and Forward

As this fiscal year winds down to a close on June 30th, let's take a moment to reflect on all the events and activities that made this such a wonderfully, vibrant year for AAUW Carlisle.

- The hallmark of our branch are interesting, thought-provoking, and fun branch meetings attended by thirty to forty members (36 average). This year we learned about making Public Policy actionable, Title IX at Dickinson College, the UUCV Bursary Project educating girls in Mozambique, the immigrant story of Samantha Jallah, and Girl Scout commitment to STEM. Very special meetings were Dr. Margee Ensign, Dickinson College President at our December holiday brunch and AAUW Carlisle members Carmen Eiserman and Gail D'Urso cooking and teaching heart healthy meals.
- The committees for Programs, Membership, Scholarship, and Public Policy plus volunteers mailing the newsletter, tabling at community events, registering voters are involving many more members than past years.
- With fifteen new members, membership increased 12.3%, placing AAUW Carlisle in the top 10 of Pennsylvania branches. The first ever new member social was held and the green leaf new member orientation program started.
- Speaking of firsts, Public Policy held the branch's first public event, Redistricting Matters, and school board candidate forum. Three Topic Talk events, voter registration events, and several letters to the editor, all contributed to the seventeen AAUW Carlisle public policy activities/events, the highest of Pennsylvania branches.
- The branch Facebook page @AAUWCarlisle has sixty-seven likes.
- A generous \$7,400 was raised through the scholarship appeal and August, December, and April opportunities.
- Twelve to fifteen members attend Book Club. A new interest group was formed—Breakfast Club, holding two Saturday morning breakfasts at local restaurants.
- Four \$1500 scholarships were awarded to amazing women and the April Scholarship Awards Banquet was a wonderful celebration.

What a busy, exciting, enriching year we have had! Our achievements are the result of every member's interest, support, volunteering, and involvement. The upcoming fiscal year, beginning July 1st, holds promise for continued vibrancy. The program committee has outdone itself with a slate of branch meetings that will amaze. We are holding a community activity event on June 21st, the first of many exciting outings. The Public Policy committee is planning an event to acknowledge Black Women Equal Pay day on August 7 and is joining the Clarke Forum for a 10th Congressional candidate forum in October. And, it is AAUW Carlisle's 95th birthday on May 10, 2019 which we will celebrate all year.

You are an AAUW member because you wanted to be an active, vibrant, mission-centered organization. With your continued involvement, ideas, support and enthusiasm, we will be that type of organization.

Equal Pay

After acknowledging Equal Pay Day for all women on April 10th, you may think there is nothing more to do. Unfortunately, that isn't the case.

Mom's Equal Pay Day was Wednesday, May 30. Working mothers are typically paid only 71 cents for every dollar fathers are paid. That means it takes five extra months of work for their median pay to catch up to what working fathers received the previous year.

Black Women Equal Pay Day is August 7, making only 63 percent of what non-Hispanic white men make. We hope to hold an event with Hope Station to explore and understand this gap. Watch for information in emails.

The new exhibit is "The Fashions of Fiction from *Pamela* to *Gatsby*". This is an innovative exhibit concept based upon descriptions of characters in the texts of seven novels. In each story, elements of dress exercise considerable influence upon plot development and reveal the temperaments of individual characters in significant ways. The exhibit will use dress to enhance the understanding regarding the descriptive references, the time periods, and the ways in which clothing enhances the authors' vision of the characters. The novels to be "dressed" comprise British, French, and American fiction, and span the eighteenth to the twentieth centuries. These novels are:

- Samuel Richardson, *Pamela* (fashions of the 1740s)
- Claire de Duras, *Ourika* (fashions of the 1790s)
- Charlotte Brontë, *Jane Eyre* (fashions of the 1790s through 1810s)
- Elizabeth Gaskell, *Cranford* (fashions of the 1830s)
- Gustave Flaubert, *Madame Bovary* (fashions of the 1840s)
- Edith Wharton, *Age of Innocence* (fashions of the 1870s)
- F. Scott Fitzgerald, *The Great Gatsby* (fashions of the 1920s)

The fashions described in these texts represent current trends at the time of publication, or those of the very recent past. Seeing the "characters" dressed for their lives will make them come alive and contribute to a greater depth of understanding of the novels. Simultaneously with its literary focus, the exhibit will provide an overview of definitive moments in the evolution of dress history, highlighting dramatic changes over the time period of the novels. In addition to dressed figures representing major characters, supporting displays of accessory items such as eighteenth-century pockets, reticules of the early nineteenth century, pattern overshoes, and calash bonnets, will provide visitors with a clearer understanding of the textual references and their greater meaning within the novels and the society of the times.

Then Comes Marriage: United States V. Windsor and the Defeat of DOMA by Roberta Kaplan

The defeat of the Defense of Marriage Act before the Supreme Court is one of the most significant civil rights victories in our nation's history. But how did the case that brought it down — Windsor v. United States — come to be? In *Then Comes Marriage*, lawyer Roberta Kaplan — who argued the case before the Supreme Court — pulls back the curtain on this landmark case, chronicling the story of how she met plaintiff Edie Windsor and their journey together to defeat DOMA and gain federal recognition for same-sex marriage.

Stolen Beauty: A Novel by Laurie Lico Albanese

Adele Bloch-Bauer's life in 1900s Vienna is charmed: She is beautiful, wealthy, intelligent, and in contact with some of the greatest figures of her time including artist Gustav Klimt, for whom she is a model and a lover. In that same city in 1938, her niece, Maria Altmann, watches in horror as the Nazis invade Austria and turn Vienna into a war zone. When the Gestapo arrive at her home, determined to transfer her property into non-Jewish hands, Maria must go to unimaginable lengths to survive and keep her family — and its history — alive. *Stolen Beauty* breathes life into the story of the two extraordinary women behind one of Gustav Klimt's most famous paintings: one the model who became *The Woman in Gold* and the other who saved it from near destruction.

AAUW Glossary of Terms

Student Affiliate (SAF)—Student-affiliate status is available to any individual enrolled as an undergraduate student in a two- or four year regionally accredited institution. Those enrolled in a school that is not a C/U Member are called SAFs and pay a fee set by the AAUW Board of Directors; e-SAFs do not pay (see e-SAF above). SAFs are entitled to attend AAUW meetings and receive the publications distributed to all members. For both SAFs and e-SAFs, the following apply: Students may affiliate with states and branches by paying any applicable student-affiliate fee(s) set by those states and branches; AAUW-PA waives dues for SAFs and e-SAFs. Students may not vote nor hold office. Upon the awarding of an associate or equivalent degree, the student affiliate may transfer to AAUW membership. If the (e-)SAF continues undergraduate work toward a bachelor's degree after receiving the associate degree, the student may choose either to become a member with the right to vote and hold office or to remain a/an (e-)SAF without those rights. Student Organization (SO)—An organized group of (e)SAFs or campus club associated with AAUW and working on women's equity. A student organization may carry on local study and action as part of an established branch, or it may operate as a campus-only entity.

Value Promise—By joining AAUW, you belong to a community that breaks through educational and economic barriers so that all women and girls have a fair chance.

Vision Statement—AAUW empowers all women and girls to reach their highest potential.

Women Graduates-USA (WG-USA)—An organization of women graduates interested in international issues affecting women and children worldwide. WG-USA is the US affiliate of the Graduate Women International (GWI), which provides a worldwide forum where university women interact on international issues.
