On March 12, five scholarships were brought to Board Meeting for approval. One of the five will be the recipient of memorial scholarship honoring Lieutenant Colonel (Ret) Edward (Woodie) Joseph Collins, Jr. Donations were received from Army War College friends and colleagues, totaling \$1250. The generosity of our membership and the special matching challenge funded the balance needed to accomplish this wonderful feat.

It was truly difficult to select the five qualified recipients from the eleven applicants. This year all applications were received on-line. The young women represented schools from Franklin & Marshall to Marywood University to University of Pittsburgh. The area of interest ranged from nursing to graphic design to accounting. We received two applications from previous winners.

Trailblazers Girls' Recognition Event You're Invited!

We hope you can join us at our Trailblazers Girls' Recognition Event on Monday, April 15 at 1:00 p.m. in the Fowler Auditorium at Carlisle High School. Light refreshments, provided by students in the Culinary Program, will follow in the Culinary Café. A special Thank You goes to Dr. Albert Parrillo, CTE Director at Carlisle Area School District, for all of his help and support in planning this event. In addition to recognizing the girls for their achievements, a panel of local women leaders will offer their insights to the girls as they prepare to move into their career fields or continue their technical education.

In keeping with our mission to support girls and women, AAUW Carlisle is launching this "Trailblazers Recognition Event" to celebrate high school girls who choose Career and Technical Education Programs of Study. This idea has evolved from recognizing girls in STEM programs (who are likely to receive recognition elsewhere) to recognition of girls who are pursuing study in vocational or technical fields. Teachers have recommended girls for recognition based on the following qualities: good citizenship at school, enthusiasm for their Program of Study, and academic competence with passing grades in all of their courses.

AAUW recognizes that many high school students face pressure to attend four-year colleges from sources at school, at home, and in the wider community and culture. Furthermore, girls who are interested in non-traditional tracks in high school, such as automotive technology, engineering or construction trades, rarely receive positive support or recognition. The combined impact of these influences may persuade some young women to pursue four year degrees, often accompanied with heavy college debts, when a vocational diploma would better suit their career goals.

The Paycheck Fairness Act

Despite federal and state equal pay laws, the gender pay gap persists. Congressional action could help change this. The Paycheck Fairness Act offers meaningful steps to update and strengthen the Equal Pay Act of 1963 including:

- closing loopholes that have weakened the law over time to allow employers to justify paying workers unfairly
- creating more robust remedies for those who have suffered discrimination
- preventing employers from retaliating against workers who discuss or disclose their wages
- prohibiting employers from relying on salary history to set wages
- providing much needed training and technical assistance
- · collecting data and research

The gender pay gap is persistent and can only be addressed if women have the tools they need to challenge discrimination and employers have the incentives they need to comply with the law.

On March 27th the House of Representatives voted 242-187 to pass the Paycheck Fairness Act with bipartisan support and now moves to the Senate. Stay tuned!

Equal Pay Day is April 2nd

Median earnings for men in Pennsylvania are \$52,111 compared to \$41,929 for women — an earnings ratio of just 80 percent, or 24th out of all states and the District of Columbia. The gap is worse for most women of color and moms. Compared to white men's wages, in Pennsylvania, Asian American women are paid 81 percent, African American women are paid 68 percent, Native American women are paid 61 percent, and Hispanic and Latina women take home just 56 percent. As efforts stall at the federal level, states can enact legislation to help women and families at the local level.

Equal Pay Day, that's the day that women finally catch up to what men earned the previous year, for 2018 earnings is April 2, 2019. We have several things planned in recognition of this momentous day:

- ➤ First of all, on April 2nd, the General Assembly is NOT in session. So we have organized members for visits with their State Representatives and State Senators in the local District Offices. We will be advocating for pay equity and supporting legislation this year in our meetings. Volunteers were provided training on "how to meet with your legislator" along with talking points and information about the pay inequity issue.
- Then on April 8th, our Carlisle ladies will join members from other AAUW branches in Harrisburg for a full day of activities. The day starts at 10:00 AM with morning snacks and social time prior to an overview and briefing led by Barbara Price of AAUW PA. Attendees then will branch out for additional advocacy meetings with their own state representatives before coming back together at 1:00 PM for a big Equal Pay Day Rally.
- ➤ The Equal Pay Day Rally will be held on April 8th in the Capitol Rotunda between 1:00 and 2:00 PM. We invite everyone to come out and support this event. We CAN make a difference!

So come one, come all and let's light up the excitement for an end to pay inequity in Pennsylvania!

The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane

In their remote mountain village, Li-yan and her family align their lives around the seasons and the farming of tea. For the Akha people, ensconced in ritual and routine, life goes on as it has for generations—until a stranger appears at the village gate in a jeep, the first automobile any of the villagers has ever seen.

The stranger's arrival marks the first entrance of the modern world in the lives of the Akha people. Slowly, Li-yan, one of the few educated girls on her mountain, begins to reject the customs that shaped her early life. When she has a baby out of wedlock—conceived with a man her parents consider a poor choice—she rejects the tradition that would compel her to give the child over to be killed, and instead leaves her, wrapped in a blanket with a tea cake tucked in its folds, near an orphanage in a nearby city.

As Li-yan comes into herself, leaving her insular village for an education, a business, and city life, her daughter, Haley, is raised in California by loving adoptive parents. Despite her privileged childhood, Haley wonders about her origins. Across the ocean Li-yan longs for her lost daughter. Over the course of years, each searches for meaning in the study of Pu'er, the tea that has shaped their family's destiny for centuries.

A powerful story about circumstances, culture, and distance, The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane paints an unforgettable portrait of a little known region and its people and celebrates the bond of family.

AAUW Carlisle is turning 95 years old! On May 10, 1924 the Carlisle Branch was founded on the Dickinson College campus. Now, it is time to celebrate! Book an appointment on your calendar for Tuesday, May 28th. We will celebrate our birthday at the Cumberland County Historical Society from 6:00pm to 8:00pm. Join us for heavy hors d'oeuvres, beverages, birthday cake and a program to honor where we have been and where we are going. Our guest speaker is the AAUW Historian, Suzanne Gould. We are trying to find out who the first 54 members of our branch were, but for now we only found the officers:

President, Mary Curran Morgan - Dickinson 1888
Vice-President, Josephine B. Meredith - Dickinson 1901
Recording Secretary, Lydia Golding - unknown
Corresponding Secretary, Hazel Bullock - Dickinson Faculty
Treasurer, Laura Norn Clarke - Dickinson 1894

We also know that 47 of the members were graduates of Dickinson College and 7 came from somewhere else. Since Wilson College is also close to Carlisle and I am a Wilson graduate, my guess would be, some of them came from there, as well as Shippensburg University, but back then it was Shippensburg College. If or when I get their names, I'll go researching our local colleges to see if I can find out where they went to college. These women were truly pioneers!


