February Branch Meeting Pulitzer Prize Winning Photojournalist Martha Rial

Martha Rial is absolutely passionate about the power of images. She fell in love with photography as a teen by studying images in *Life* and *Look* magazines. Her desire to tell compelling stories has taken her from the mountains of Haiti to African villages to the streets of her hometown, Pittsburgh. Through her camera lens, she sees a world peopled by individuals who project dignity, energy, and purpose, and whose images deserve remembrance and display.

A native of the Pittsburgh, PA area, and sister to our own branch member Sue Royer, Martha is a graduate of Ohio University School of Visual Communications, and has worked as a photojournalist for newspapers in Florida (Post Gazette and Ft. Pierce-St Lucy Tribune) and Journal Newspapers in Northern Virginia.

In 1996, she spent a month in Tanzania and Rowanda, where her sister Amy was a nurse setting up feeding stations on the border for Burundian and Rowandan refugee survivors of the 1994 genocide. Her documentation of their lives and struggles earned her the Pulitzer Prize for Photography. Martha does not rest on her Pulitzer laurels, which she simply sees as being in the right place at the right time. She recently contributed photographs to the Marcellus Shale Documentary Project, and was selected as one of the photographers for the Downtown Now Photography Project, a special initiative of The Heinz Foundation. Her work has been exhibited at the Carnegie Museum of Art, Silver Eye Center for Photography, Pittsburgh Cultural Trust Galleries, and Hewlett Gallery at Carnegie Mellon University.

Killers of the Flower Moon David Grann Monday, February 4, 2019, 1 p.m. Sue Royer

In the 1920s, the richest people per capita in the world were members of the Osage Nation in Oklahoma. After oil was discovered beneath their land, the Osage rode in chauffeured automobiles, built mansions, and sent their children to study in Europe.

Then, one by one, the Osage began to be killed off. The family of an Osage woman, Mollie Burkhart, became a prime target. One of her relatives was shot. Another was poisoned. And it was just the beginning, as more and more Osage were dying under mysterious circumstances, and many of those who dared to investigate the killings were themselves murdered.

As the death toll rose, the newly created FBI took up the case, and the young director, J. Edgar Hoover, turned to a former Texas Ranger named Tom White to try to unravel the mystery. White put together an undercover team, including a Native American agent who infiltrated the region, and together with the Osage began to expose one of the most chilling conspiracies in American history.

When Theodore Roosevelt became president in 1901, his beautiful and flamboyant daughter was transformed into "Princess Alice," arguably the century's first global celebrity. Thirty-two years later, Alice's first cousin Eleanor moved into the White House as First Lady. The two women had been born eight months and twenty blocks apart in New York City, spent much of their childhoods together, and were far more alike than most historians acknowledge. But their politics and personalities couldn't have been more distinct.

Democratic icon Eleanor was committed to social justice and hated the limelight; Republican Alice was an opponent of big government who gained notoriety for her cutting remarks. The cousins liked to play up their rivalry—in the 1930s they even wrote opposing syndicated newspaper columns and embarked on competing nationwide speaking tours. When the family business is politics, winning trumps everything. Lively, intimate, and stylishly written, *Hissing Cousins* is a double biography of two extraordinary women whose entwined lives give us a sweeping look at the twentieth century in America.

We are exploring the idea of a Spring 2019 bus trip to two of Frank Lloyd Wright's architectural marvels.


The Fallingwater house (<u>https://www.fallingwater.org/</u>) and the Kentuck Knob house (<u>https://kentuckknob.com/</u>).
