AAUW Pennsylvania sponsors four \$500 grants for Pennsylvania residents (do not need to be attending a college/university in Pennsylvania) and accepts donations from branches to fund additional grants. Thanks to an anonymous donation, I am proud to announce that AAUW Carlisle created the fifth AAUW Pennsylvania grant. Applications for the grant is due February 28, 2020.

### Research



New research, released November 2019, <u>Limiting Our Livelihoods: The Cumulative Impact of Sexual Harassment on Women's Careers</u> documents how women of all ages experience workplace sexual harassment. The report finds that workplace sexual harassment can take a toll on women's physical and mental health, limit their job choices, reduce prospects for career development and even force them out of the workforce. These negative effects compound over time, reducing women's lifetime earnings and contributing to both the gender and retirement wage gaps, the report concludes.



An element of the AAUW Carlisle strategic plan was to evaluate the need for increasing branch member dues. At the January Board meeting, the Board approved a dues increase for you to consider. According to our Policies and Procedures: The membership shall be notified about any proposed change in Branch dues at two Branch meetings and by newsletter prior to a vote. To comply with this, we will announce at the January and February Branch meetings; include in the February and March newsletters; take a membership vote at the March Branch meeting.

### What Do We Get from our Branch Dues?

In the past year, we initiated our Trailblazers Girls Recognition Event, hosted numerous Public Policy events, including candidate forums and the Rally on the Square, made donations to Camp Invention and AAUW National, participated in the Army Heritage Education Center's 2019 Welcome Expo and the Harvest of the Arts Voter Registration, facilitated Work Smart events, purchased Directors and Officers Liability and Sponsored Events Liability Insurance Policies, participated in the YWCA's 100th Anniversary Fun Day, had a marvelous August kick-off meeting with 48 members attending, sent dozens of get well, Thanksgiving, and sympathy cards, purchased Gift Cards for presenters at our Branch meetings, used lots of postage stamps to welcome our many new members, and enjoyed a beautifully catered celebration at our 95th Anniversary.

Our membership has swelled to 104 in the last year, which is truly a testament to the vibrancy of our Carlisle Branch. Recently, Barb Attivo, Kathleen Brennan, Linda Brunski, Carolyn Freberg, Virginia Mauk, and Gail D'Urso met to evaluate our branch dues. AAUW Pennsylvania surveyed branches with 50 to 150 members and found a wide range, with one branch's dues as high as \$33. The median charge is \$16. Our dues have been at \$13 since the late 1980's. As our branch grows, members have expressed interest in expanding our reach, increasing our visibility, and partnering with other organizations. At the heart of it all is our mission to advocate on behalf of women and girls.

At the January 14 Board Meeting, a motion was made to increase branch dues to \$20 per year. This is a \$7 increase overall, from \$82 to \$89 per year. With consideration to increases in spending to support these many new initiatives, the Board voted unanimously to recommend this increase in branch dues to the membership, with voting by anonymous ballot at our March meeting. We are grateful to everyone who participated in this process.

### **Exploring DIVERSITY and INCLUSION**


AAUW Carlisle Board committed in the Strategic Plan to discuss the topic of Diversity and Inclusion. Click <a href="here">here</a> to read the plan.

### **Beyond Suffrage: Steps to Economic Equity**

Sponsored by: AAUW Carlisle, YWCA Carlisle, Hope Station, MomsRising, Cumberland Valley Rising, Carlisle Area Youth Council, Community Action Network, Charles Bruce Foundation, Dickinson Women's Law Caucus and the National Coalition of 100 Black Women.

The recent AAUW Carlisle Member Survey told us that most of you greatly appreciated the success of our Women's Rally last January. Given member feedback, the Public Policy Committee has decided to join again with our community partners to host another women's event - this time with the focus on the barriers women still face of true economic equity and security. Our Rally was a call to arms and Beyond Suffrage aims to take a deeper dive into the workplace and societal issues we face, with the goal of compiling our ideas and takeaways into a document, which we will be presenting to our legislators in Harrisburg.

There will be a light dinner, followed by two in-depth sessions. The first one will be on Social Biases and Barriers, including stereotypes, intersectionality, sexism, and educational opportunity. And the second one will be on Workplace Challenges, including equal pay, paid family leave, affordable childcare, and minimum wage. Each session will have a keynote and panel discussion with leaders and authorities in these areas, followed by smaller interactive group discussions. Feedback and takeaways will be gathered and integrated into a report, which we will take to our legislators.



Our voices will also be heard through our accompanying Quilt Project. Participants will be given 8"x 8" squares of fabric and asked to write examples of when they have experienced gender inequity or bias. They will be sewn together after the event and presented at the Capital.

### Topic Talk: Why Pennsylvania needs Charter/Cyber reform

How much do you know about cyber schools? What about charter schools? How are they funded, what are their performance requirements and do we have appropriate controls and monitoring in place? How do they impact Public Schools and what does it mean for Pennsylvania's children?

The Public Policy Committee invites you and your guests to attend our next Topic Talk to learn and discuss issues around cyber and charter schools. We will meet on Thursday, February 13th at 7:00 p.m. at the home of Pat Markowski, 88 Presidents Drive, Mechanicsburg, PA.

We are honored to have Susan Spicka join us as our discussion leader. Susan is executive director of Education Voters of PA. She became involved in education advocacy in 2011 after Governor Corbett announced his plan to cut more than \$1 billion from public education funding. Her first advocacy adventure was as co-founder of Education Matters in the Cumberland Valley, a grassroots organization that is dedicated to advocating for policies that support quality public education. Most recently, she has focused her efforts on cyber and charter schools in Pennsylvania, working with Governor Wolf to, not only, understand and draw attention to the impact to public education, but to find solutions to effectively deal with the unintended consequences of charter and cyber schools.

### **About Gerrymandering**

With the approach of the 2020 US Census and the upcoming November election, we wanted to give you an update on where redistricting stands in the PA Legislature.

After the decennial Census, legislative districts (federal and state) are redrawn per state laws. Gerrymandering, is the term used when the districts are redrawn to favor one political party and/or ideological viewpoint. Pennsylvania is recognized by many voting rights groups as one of the three most-gerrymandered states in the Union. Consequences of gerrymandering: it protects incumbent elected officials; marginalizes minority populations; polarizes the legislature, severely reducing the number of bills that make it to the floor for passage; makes legislators much less responsive to all constituents of their district. Both political parties are equal offenders. Any party in power can draw districts in their own favor, unless a nonpartisan mechanism is adopted to ensure that voting districts accurately reflect their constituent populations.

Fair Districts PA is leading the reform movement in Pennsylvania. The bills up for consideration in Pennsylvania are bipartisan House Bills 22 and 23, which call for a non-partisan citizens' commission to draw new lines for US Congressional and PA Legislative Districts (similar bipartisan bills are under consideration by the PA Senate). Briefly put, the commission would consist of four Republicans, four Democrats, and three Independent/Other. A positive vote from each faction would be required to pass a proposed map. Members could not be elected officials, lobbyists, or family members of same.

To accord with the timing of the 2020 US Census, any legislation to create a non-partisan commission must pass the PA House and Senate in the 2019-2020 legislative session, for the commission to be in place in time for the 2021 May Primary. While both bills have bipartisan sponsorship, they can still be stalled before coming to debate and a vote at the whim of committee chairs. In order to have legitimate consideration and a fair vote, our legislators need to hear from AAUW voters who want a long-term solution to fair voter representation.
