


## Julia Jennings: Feminist: One Women's Pursuit of the Vote

### 2020 Convention -- CANCELLED

Originally scheduled for April 24-26, in mid-March, the convention was postponed to July 13-15. At the time of that decision, there was little known about the coronavirus and duration of the pandemic, so it seemed July was realistic.

Current knowledge indicates that a gathering of 113 (number of registrants for April) cannot safely occur in July. At the April 18<sup>th</sup> AAUW Pennsylvania Board meeting, we voted to cancel the 2020 AAUW Pennsylvania State Convention, at least the face-to-face part. We are writing a comprehensive message to address all the moving parts -- refund process; alternate plans for delivering the content. ## PUBLIC POLICY UPDATE

### Women & Girls: *How are we doing in the days of COVID-19?*

I feel proud. I am proud that the work we do day in and day out advocating for women and girls in this country is having an impact. Not because we have solved all of the inequities we face but because awareness of these problems has at least become mainstream. How do I know this? Well, the latest example comes with the media response to COVID-19 which has included a myriad of reporting around the impacts of COVID-19 on women, the leadership that women around the world are offering and the frontline and behind the scenes work women are doing to take care of us all. I can't possibly cover everything reported but I'll highlight a few of the key points that stand out for me. I'm also including links to several articles for those of you who want more information.

#### Women in Leadership

The COVID-19 pandemic has spotlighted women leaders from around the globe. Political leaders in Germany, New Zealand, Taiwan, Iceland, Finland, Norway and Denmark have demonstrated that women often make the best leaders, especially during times of crisis, and are faring well as compared to their male counterparts.

In Germany, Chancellor Angela Merkel received praise for acting quickly to keep case counts and deaths low. Measures put in place early included school and day care center closures, banning large gatherings and closing borders. This resulted in recent curve flattening and fewer deaths as compared with similar sized countries.

Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern of New Zealand closed down tourism and instituted her country's highest shut down measures in March. As a result, the island nation of nearly 5 million people has had just 1,440 confirmed cases as of April 20<sup>th</sup>.

Taiwan, with nearly 24 million people, has just 420 coronavirus cases as of my writing of this review. Led by President Tsai Ing-wen, Taiwan acted quickly to institute specific approaches for case identification, containment, and resource allocation beginning in late December with 124 action items implemented within 5 weeks to help contain the virus.

Iceland, led by Prime Minister Katrin Jakobsdottir, has tested 10% of its population for COVID-19, a percentage far higher than anywhere else in the world. The country has banned gatherings of more than 20 people, but not imposed a full national lockdown. Iceland has reported 1770 confirmed coronavirus infections to date.

Finland recently doubled its coronavirus testing capacity and rolled out nationwide antibody testing as reported by their local media. In a recent poll, 85% of Finns said they approve of 34 year old Prime Minister Sanna Marin's handling of the pandemic, which has sickened 3,783.

In Norway, Prime Minister Erna Solberg announced last week that some of the country's strict control measures implemented in March would be relaxed, including reopening kindergartens and some businesses. New reported cases have leveled off flattening the curve. A total of 7,078 people have been infected.

Prime Minister Mette Frederiksen closed her country's borders on March 13<sup>th</sup>. A few days later she closed kindergartens, schools and universities and banned gatherings of more than 10 people. This decisiveness appears to have spared Denmark the worst of the pandemic with 7,384 confirmed cases.

#### Women on the Front Lines

The roles that women have in most societies around the world place many of them squarely in the path of COVID-19 (although men may have a higher death rate than women as seen in some reports).

As reported in the [New York Times](#), it is estimated that women make up almost 70% of all healthcare workers worldwide (78% in the U.S.) with most of them occupying nursing roles. Despite the risk to themselves and to family members, heroic women are working on the frontlines to combat and contain the outbreaks, hoping to keep all of us safe and healthy.

Women are also out there in other essential roles in a big way. Food services such as grocery workers, food delivery, pharmacy workers, postal services and so many more!

#### Economic and Social Inequities Magnified

A recent report named "[The Impact of COVID-19 on Women](#)" and presented by the United Nations says, "The year 2020, marking the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Beijing Platform for Action, was intended to be ground-breaking for gender

equality. Instead, with the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic even the limited gains made in the past decades are at risk of being rolled back. The pandemic is deepening pre-existing inequalities, exposing vulnerabilities in social, political and economic systems which are in turn amplifying the impacts of the pandemic". This is a hair-raising assessment that should be of concern to all.

In most recessions, men are more adversely hit with job loss than women as typically the construction and manufacturing sectors are heavily impacted. In this crisis, however, it will be the opposite. Industries more heavily supported with women workers have been shuttered and will likely have slow recoveries. Examples include restaurants, hospitality and travel related businesses. Expect job loss and salary and benefit interruptions or loss that will negatively affect the economic security of women. The modest advances made over the past several decades towards equal pay could slip away. Employer provided healthcare lost. Savings for education, emergencies and retirement could be depleted. Low income and middle income women, especially those who are single heads of households, will be impacted the most.

Loss of childcare options will place enormous burdens on women. With school closures widespread, parents must deal

with at home learning as well as 24/7 childcare. Women most often pick up the childcare responsibilities and will therefore feel the impact as they struggle to return to or maintain gainful employment.

Risk of increased violence against women is anticipated. With stay at home orders in place and with emergency first responders working hard on virus related issues there is a great concern that women facing domestic violence will not only be on the increase but women will have fewer options or places to go to for help.
