

In celebration of the 100th Anniversary of passage of the 19th Amendment, our very own AAUW Carlisle member, Peggy Jennings, will be giving a presentation on her great aunt, Julia Jennings, a prominent suffragist.

Julia served as the Virginia legislative chair for the National Women's Party. Her advocacy for women's suffrage included participating in the now-famous demonstrations at the White House gates, and frequent lobbying efforts with state and national legislators.

Peggy has some wonderful artifacts from her aunt's suffrage activities that she will be sharing with us.

We are also excited that our friend, collaborator, and rising freshman at Gettysburg College, Samantha Martin from the Carlisle Area Youth Council created a video about the importance of the vote and breaking barriers, which we will share during the webinar.



The Cumberland County Historical Society, along with the Carlisle Area League of Women Voters, will be invited to join us. For those of you who are unable to attend, the webinar will be recorded.

From the President

Happy New Year! AAUW's fiscal year that is. Welcome FY21 (July 1, 2020 – June 30, 2021). We start this new year in the same place as FY20 ended – dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic and the uncertainty of the future. What we do know, this pandemic is disrupting everything and an altered normal will result.

AAUW Carlisle starts this fiscal year strong. 89% of members renewed – so we start the fiscal year with 94 members. 64 took advantage of renewing online (24 more than last year), 67 renewed before the June 1st deadline to be eligible for the opportunity to receive one of the two free AAUW national memberships. The winners are Cherry France and Sue Royer. Everyone renewed before the June 30th deadline. Thank you for renewing your AAUW Carlisle membership. With your commitment to [AAUW's gender equity agenda](#), we are going to have another outstanding year. As a reminder, this [FY20 annual report](#) shows all we accomplished.

The Board held a special meeting on July 29th to discuss the impact of COVID-19 on branch activities, traditions, and routines. What has been routine or familiar in the past will change. This is what I know at the writing of this article:

- No in-person branch meetings or events for the foreseeable future. We will provide as much virtual programming as possible. So, look forward to more opportunities to gather (virtually) than just the fourth Tuesday of the month. What was previously part of a branch meeting agenda may become a topic-specific program (like the presentation of our Gateway of Equity Award to Safronia Perry, page 6).
- We purchased a Zoom meeting and webinar license to accommodate this new virtual meeting reality. For more on Zoom, see page 4, including dates for demonstration sessions.
- Branch business will now be accomplished online (like approving the FY21 budget, usually done at the September branch meeting). Since the September 22nd branch meeting is a special event (page 7) open to the public, we won't conduct branch business. Instead, we will have a special business meeting in September.
- Familiar fundraising activities are cancelled – including August's silent auction and "raffle" events to support branch initiatives. Watch for creative virtual replacements.
- Sadly, Bridge Flight has disbanded after decades of continuous play and support of the Higher Education Scholarship fund.
- The Board held an ad hoc meeting on July 29th to discuss the FY21 budget projected deficit. Budgeted expenses were cut because of projected reduced fundraising income. Details will be provided when the final budget is presented for membership approval in September.
- The Yearbook will not be printed in FY21 because of budget. We were spoiled with the Dickinson Print Shop and printing anywhere else would double the expense. So, we will create a "Members Only" page on our website and post the FY21 Yearbook there. This decision will be re-evaluated for FY22. Watch for more information toward the end of August.
- Yes, you will receive more frequent emails from aauwcarlisleinfo@gmail.com. Without seeing each other, we think it is important not to rely solely on the monthly newsletter to keep you informed of branch activities.

The AAUW Carlisle Board is wrestling with how members can stay connected online and in-person with social distance. So, watch for emails with updates and opportunities. Your ideas are welcome. So, if there is something you want to do or you have ideas of how/where to hold an in-person with socially distanced activity, please let us know.

As I start my last year as AAUW Carlisle President, I am hopeful in spite of the challenges caused by this new reality. The Board is committed to continuing our work on AAUW's gender equity agenda in Carlisle. We have the most members in my five year membership history. AAUW Carlisle is recognized as a vibrant organization. We are creative and resilient. The great COVID-19 disruption is shaking off the inertia and perhaps AAUW Carlisle traditions will be refreshed and new ones created. It is going to be an exciting year.

I miss seeing and talking with you. Please stay healthy.

What's Up in Pennsylvania? News from AAUW Pennsylvania




The 2020 AAUW Pennsylvania Convention was scheduled for April 24-26, postponed to July 13-15 and then cancelled. However, some traditions continued.

INTRODUCING our New Partner

Say hello to Zoom -- the platform AAUW Carlisle will use to conduct meetings and webinars online. It is familiar (if not ubiquitous), relatively easy to learn, reasonably priced, has excellent online support materials, and is feature rich. Here is what you need to know.



You will be able to join a meeting or webinar:

- ✓ From any device – [computer, tablet, phone](#)
- ✓ By clicking the link. You may [bypass the Zoom application download process](#) and join a meeting directly from your browser. This is a workaround for participants who are unable to download, install, or run applications. Note that the meeting experience from the browser is limited.
- ✓ From your [phone with audio only](#). Don’t have an internet connection or don’t want to use video? You may dial in with the “participant audio only” mode. Of course, you won’t be able to see other participants or presented content.

A Zoom meeting is where all participants are visible and can speak. We will use this for business meetings and informal discussions. Webinars are more staged and will be used for speakers and public events. In a webinar, the video and audio for all attendees is turned off. You watch, listen and interact through Chat and Q & A. To ensure security, when joining a meeting you will always be placed in a waiting room and then allowed to enter by the meeting host. Sometimes you will be asked to register for a meeting or webinar by clicking a link and providing your name and email address. Once registered, you will receive an individualized link for the meeting or webinar, not to be shared.

To help you feel comfortable, AAUW Carlisle member Peggy Jennings will hold [drop-in, informal sessions to introduce Zoom](#). This way you can practice with a friend. [30 minutes on August 4, 6, or 13. Attend at your convenience.](#) Watch for an email with dates, times, and meeting link information. 2020 GATEWAY TO EQUITY Award Presentation and Virtual Meeting

On July 15th, AAUW Carlisle Public Policy Committee chairs Nancy Sigrist, Kate Elkins and Katie Perkowski met for a socially distant outdoor luncheon at Fiddler's Green to present Safronia Perry, Hope Station Executive Director, with the 2020 Gateway to Equity Award. The Gateway to Equity Award was established by AAUW PA to recognize an individual, group, organization, or business that has shown by action and philosophy the promotion of equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, or research. The award is typically given by AAUW branches in Pennsylvania in recognition of International Women's Day (March 8th), but this year was delayed due to the pandemic.



The Gateway to Equity Award recognized the many contributions Safronia and Hope Station have made to further issues of equity for women and girls in our community. AAUW Carlisle members had the opportunity to learn more about Safronia and the work of Hope Station, a community development non-profit, during a special branch meeting held via Zoom on July 28th. Safronia spoke about her work with Hope Station and as a community activist, and about her hopes for the future. She also spoke to her experiences in Carlisle as a woman of color, and the ways in which we can improve and grow relationships between white and communities of color in Carlisle. Safronia was honored by the award and expressed great appreciation for the ongoing support of AAUW Carlisle to Hope Station.



Dear State and Branch Presidents,

A recent article in the Washington Post's The Lily, an online publication on gender equity, raised some important questions about racism in women's organizations, including AAUW. As an organization that is almost 140 years old, AAUW has a lot of work to do to address the structural racism that pervades our society.

On behalf of the AAUW board, we are committed to continuing our own growth, while leading AAUW to become more equitable and inclusive.

At the same time, we want to remind you of the progress we've made together in the following areas:

- Among our 2019-20 AAUW Fellows and grantees, 66% are women of color. Our largest and oldest program has funded more than 13,000 women to pursue graduate school education, many of whom are luminaries in studies of gender, race and intersectionality.
- Our Work Smart and Start Smart salary negotiation programs also serve diverse audiences. We have a wide range of partners and programs, including a robust career initiative with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) students, faculty and alumni, thanks to our Coca-Cola Foundation support.
- Fifty-two percent of our staff and 30% of our leadership are people of color. Our member-elected national board has three women of color currently. AAUW places great value in having diverse perspectives in prioritizing our projects.

Yet there is more we must do. That's why I'm challenging you to reflect on what you can do as AAUW members — individually and collectively — to make a difference. **For example, you have the power to reimagine what it means to be an AAUW member, beginning with our educational degree requirement.** As we strive to be inclusive of **all** women's lives and experiences, the time has more than come to let go of this unnecessary prerequisite while continuing to embrace education as a central and lasting part of our mission.

It's not enough for AAUW to denounce racism; we must take real, sustained and measurable actions to be the change we want to see in the world. And I know we all want a world where every voice is heard and every person is valued.
