March Branch Meeting with Moving Circles

"Who feels called to be in a caring and learning conversation talking about how we can create what Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. called *Beloved Community*?" This question posed at a community potluck at the YWCA Carlisle is how Moving Circles – a conversation circle fostering racial and cultural literacy – began.

This grassroots initiative answers the question so many are asking – how can I make a difference? People often dismiss small steps, not believing that committed first steps can grow into ever-widening circles and coalitions with a real impact.

Moving Circles seeks to inspire people to take action toward individual and collective social change, network to build welcoming and sustainable communities, and restore the human spirit. Moving Circles empowers people to build bridges, create dialogue, and take actions towards transformative and hopeful futures.

We are increasingly being told that Moving Circles serves as a model that groups can replicate to move their communities forward. Sonya Browne and Marcia Berry will share the story of how Moving Circles got started and how it grew into ever-widening circles of community groups and collaborations, such as Not in Our Town Carlisle and the Greater Carlisle Community Responders Network (CRN).

PRESENTER BIOS: Marcia Le Roy Berry and Sonya Browne

Marcia Le Roy Berry is a co-founder of Moving Circles, a non-profit focusing on building bridges, creating dialogue, and taking actions toward transformative and hopeful futures. She brings over 20 years of communications, consulting, organizational development, and training experience to this work. She founded Englobus Communications and Development Group in Chicago, a consulting practice specializing in language, communications, culture, diversity, leadership and organizational development; and eSpirit Bridge which offers *ReSpirit Coaching* – a spirit-centered coaching dialogue bridging the knowledge of your truest self with purposeful action, expression, and realization.

Marcia holds a Master's degree in Linguistics from Northeastern Illinois University with a concentration in Teaching English as a Second Language. She holds additional degrees in Spanish and Media Communication Science and a Certificate in Multicultural Studies from George Washington University.

Marcia currently serves on the Advisory Council to the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission and the Racial Justice Coalition of the YWCA Carlisle.

Sonya Browne is currently the Executive Director for Domestic Violence Services of Cumberland and Perry Counties. Before coming to DVS, she served as Mission Impact Director at YWCA Carlisle, focusing on racial justice and the empowerment of women and girls.

From the President

If the male to female population ratio has been roughly a 50/50 deal throughout history, why is women's history relegated to one twelfth of the calendar year? Or for janthat matter, why is our history called "Women's History"? Is it to distinguish it from that other niche of history called "Men's History"? According to Google, it seems I'm not the only inquiring mind wanting to know these things.

As a one-time history major and unapologetic bibliophile, I am inextricably drawn towards nonfiction accounts of major world events and notable people. From a very young age, I've read widely and deeply in subjects that have sparked my interest in the history and biography sections of libraries. And from a very young age, it didn't escape my notice that the accounts of major world events and notable people had curiously few women. Why is that?

For one, the significant, if not central, contribution of women in shaping history is often subsumed to the role of the male counterpart or boss who then gets top billing in the story. Gertrude Bell had a seat at the table where the fate of the Middle East was being determined at the end of World War I. Yet, it is another man at the table, T.E. Lawrence, who has commonly been cited as the authority on Arab tribes whose knowledge then shaped the formation of the modern nation states in the region. Howell 2006) This is not unlike Frances Perkins whose years of experience working on behalf of the poorest and least protected members of society then informed her masterful formation of Social Security and other social safety net programs. Yet, the history of these New Deal era programs most often neglect to place her in the vital central role she played in their creation and adoption by a skeptical group of lawmakers and boss. (See <u>The Woman Behind the New Deal: The Life and Legacy of Frances Perkins - Social Security, Unemployment Insurance and the Minimum Wage</u> by K. Downey 2009)

Another reason why we may not have read of women's roles in major world events is because they were "secret," "hidden" and, for too long, "untold." The current titles populating my internet algorithm for book recommendations all seem to be variations on this historical exposé. (See <u>The Secret History of Home Economics, How Trailblazing Women</u> <u>Harnessed The Power of Home and Changed The Way We Live</u> by D. Dreilinger 2021, <u>Hidden Figures: The American</u> <u>Dream and the Untold Story of the Black Women Mathematicians Who Helped Win the Space Race</u> by M.L. Shetterly 2016, and <u>Code Girls: The Untold Story of the American Women Code Breakers of World War II</u> by L. Mandy 2017).

Whatever factors aligned to prevent the rightful inclusion and full expression of women's stories in the written narratives of our history, let's not be complicit in the continuation of this historical silencing. The first step we must take is to know our own history - the names, the events, the discoveries and the cultural contributions women have made and continue to make. (See <u>Women and Leadership, Real Lives, Real Lessons</u> by J. Gillard and N. Okonjo-Iweala 2020, <u>An Illuminated Life, Belle Da Costa Greene's Journey From Prejudice to Privilege</u> by H. Ardizzone 2021 and <u>The Light of Days, The Untold Story of Women Resistance Fighters in Hitler's Ghettos</u> by J. Battalion 2020).

Next, we must share the stories that we know of the women who came before us who helped to pave the way for a future we now enjoy. (See <u>Founding Mothers: The Women Who Raised Our Nation</u> by C. Roberts 2004 and <u>First, Sandra Day O'Connor</u> by E. Thomas 2019) But most importantly, we must commit ourselves to share the stories of the women we know who are doing great things right now, right here in our community. This is a task that I believe AAUW Carlisle does so well by offering a public forum to shine a spotlight on the notable women in our midst doing important work. Just this past year, we featured Jean Handley with Fair Districts PA and Dean Danielle Conway of Penn State Dickinson Law, and later this month our guest speakers will be Marcia Berry and Sonya Browne with Moving Circles.

An excellent example of women doing great things right now, right here in our community is our own Public Policy Committee. This dedicated bunch of policy wonks have committed themselves to educating our community about our Constitutional foundations and election system with a three part series titled "Civics 911." These programs will be offered at the Bosler Library on March 21st, 30th and April 4th featuring an array of topic expert speakers - from within our Branch and from our wider community.

And so, in the spirit of Women's History Month, join me in "talking up" the outstanding work of the notable women in our Public Policy Committee to spread the news of their "Civics 911" series and encourage others to join us at the Bosler! - Amanda Hamman: Amanda is a 2017 graduate of Carlisle high school's culinary program. She earned a Silver Medal at a SkillsUSA competition. She earned an Associate's degree in Culinary Arts/Business Management from YTI Career Institute in Lancaster. She has worked in many kitchens, including as a sous chef at Greystone Public House. Currently she is a Saute Cook at Harvest Season Grill and Wine Bar in Harrisburg.
- **Katy Kreitzer:** At an early age, Katy would come home from school, change into her "overalls" and run to her father's automotive garage. She maintained her interest in CTE courses throughout high school and attended Universal Technical Institute leading to employment at an Audi dealership, the Harley Davidson factory and, now, is a partner with her father at Kreitzer Automotive.
- Safronia Perry: Safronia is Executive Director of Hope Station in Carlisle, serving adults and youth in a low-income neighborhood. She attended OIC of Carlisle, the Academy of Medical Arts and Business, and has taken classes from University of Phoenix and Messiah College. Safronia has served on local and regional commissions and boards, including Leadership Cumberland and the PA Humanities Council. She is a member of the Heart & Soul Committee, the National Coalition of 100 Black Women, Harrisburg, and is a Carlisle borough council member.

The Trailblazer Award is given by AAUW Carlisle in keeping with the AAUW mission of supporting women and girls and celebrates high school girls who choose vocational or technical fields of study. AAUW Carlisle created the Trailblazer Award in 2019 because we recognize that many high school students face pressure to attend four-year colleges, and girls who are interested in non-traditional tracks in high school, e.g., health care, culinary arts or automotive technology may not otherwise receive positive support or recognition. The combined impact of these influences may persuade some young women to pursue four-year degrees, often accumulating significant college debt, when a vocational diploma or later study at a community college or trade school better suits their career goals. Student honorees are selected based on criteria of good citizenship at school, enthusiasm for their program of study, and academic competence with passing grades in all courses.

CIVICS 9-1-1: A THREE-PART SERIES ON CIVIC ENGAGEMENT AND CITIZENSHIP

The Public Policy Committee has prepared a three-part non-partisan civics engagement seminar series: *Civics 9-1-1.* The first session explores the constitutional foundations of the United States and discusses the democratic norms that are critical to maintaining our democratic institutions. Marybeth Ulrich, Professor of Government at the U.S. Army War College, and Judge Mary D. France will lead this seminar. The second week focuses on strategies to improve civil discourse and will feature an exchange between Cumberland County Commissioners Jean Foschi and Vince DiFilippo on how to find common ground across party lines. Chris Baxter, Founder and Executive Director of Spotlight PA will also discuss the effects of social media and how to identify disinformation. The final session centers on citizen engagement and raising awareness about the May elections. Bethany Salzarulo, Director, Cumberland County Bureau of Elections, Paula Bussard, President, Board of Directors, Carlisle Area School District, and Stephen Caruso, Capitol Reporter, Spotlight PA., will be the presenters. AAUW Pennsylvania's Mission-Critical Program series, via Zoom continues. Watch emails for dates and registration details. The most recent presentation was organized by AAUW Pennsylvania..

War on Ukraine: Thursday, February 9, 2023 looked at current events with Dr. Lena Surzhko Harned is an Associate Teaching Professor of Political Science and the Associate Director of the Public Policy Fund at Penn State University, Behrend College. As we near the one-year anniversary of the Russian War on Ukraine, many of us seek to better understand the causes of this grim conflict, the state of the war today, and whether peace is possible. Dr. Surzhko Harned provides an extensive analysis. She discusses the historical background, the nature and course of the war, its devastating impact upon the country, and how Ukrainians are coping on a day-to-day basis. Of the nearly 12 million Ukrainians who fled their country last Spring, most were women and children. News from National AAUW Update

Ratify the Equal Rights Amendment

The majority of Americans mistakenly believe that women and men are guaranteed equal rights under the U.S. Constitution.

A while back, I started thinking about the milestones of women's rights in my lifetime. And I know there are additional milestones earlier in time. We have to fight for each of these rights separately—because there is no constitutional protection. That is why the passage of ERA is so important.

- Not experience discrimination in getting a job. (Equal Opportunity Commission 1968)
- Get a divorce with some degree of ease. (No Fault Divorce 1969)
- Equal access to sports and education opportunities from K-college. (Title IX 1972)
- Have a legal abortion. (Roe v. Wade 1973)
- Get her own credit card. (Equal Credit Opportunity Act 1974)
- Not lose her job if she was pregnant. (Pregnancy Discrimination Act in 1978)
- Report cases of sexual harassment in the workplace. (Equal Employment Opportunity Commission 1980)
- Husband no longer has unilateral control over the joint property. (Kirchberg v. Feenstra 1981)
- Refuse to have sex with her husband. (Marital rape criminalized 1993)
- Women receiving equal pay. (Equal Pay Act 1963 and Lily Ledbetter Fair Pay Restoration Act 2009)

The Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) would, once and for all, guarantee constitutional equality between men and women. Its ratification would provide the constitutional guarantee that all men and women are truly equal under the law and that these rights cannot easily be abridged.
