Dorene Wilbur is a veteran educator who spent 27 years in the field, 20 of which were with the Carlisle Area School District where she taught middle and high school English. Dorene made an indelible impact on her students by exposing them to diverse

perspectives and literature.
Furthermore, she created CASD's first
Black Student Union, took students on
field trips to the Smithsonian's National
Museum of African American History
and Culture, introduced students to
Historically Black Colleges and
Universities (HBCUs), and mentored
many students and teachers.



As Dorene concluded her career in education, she accepted a position as the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion specialist with the PA Office of Attorney General. Although she has been there only a little more than a year, she has garnered a partnership with Pennsylvania's own HBCU, Lincoln University; created over 14 original training programs; established employee resource groups; and helped nurture diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging in offices across the Commonwealth.

News from National— AAUW Update

AAUW is proposing a Bylaw change to eliminate the degree requirement for membership. This is referred to as "open membership."

You already received an email from Shannon Wolfe, managing director and chief of staff for AAUW, launching the comment period (which ended January 26). Voting will take place April 3-May 15. Most members will receive emails from vote@simplyvoting.com with their unique Elector ID and Password to vote. All members without an email address on file or who have unsubscribed from AAUW national emails will receive a paper ballot by mail. No additional paper ballots will be sent during the voting period.

Public Policy Committee Updates

The Committee met to plan for AAUW's participation in the **Black Cultural Festival** hosted by Hope Station on Saturday, February 24th. We will work with the Membership Committee to host a table with information about AAUW and the work we do.



Please write your legislators to ask them to support the **PA Family Care Act**. See https://www.familycareact.com/take-action. The PA Family Care Act addresses a pressing need in our state by providing essential support for families who are caring for their loved ones. Caring for a family member—a child, spouse, parent, or other relative—can be both emotionally and financially challenging. This Act would help by:

- Offering Paid Family and Medical Leave: Providing employees with paid time off to care for their own health or the health of a family member ensures that they can prioritize their well-being without facing financial hardship.
- Supporting Working Caregivers: Acknowledging the invaluable role that caregivers play in our society, the Act aims to offer job protection and financial assistance to those who need to take time off to provide care.
- **Promoting Economic Stability:** By helping families maintain their financial stability during times of caregiving, the Act contributes to the overall well-being of Pennsylvania's communities.
- Fostering a Compassionate Society: The Pennsylvania Family Care Act sends a strong message that our state values compassion, family, and the health and well-being of its citizens.

This is a call to action for PA voters. Write your state Representative and Senator declaring your expectation for passing minimum wage legislation in 2024. Pennsylvania's minimum wage remains at \$7.25 per hour, stagnant since 2009. Five of our neighboring states (Ohio, New York, New Jersey, Maryland, and Delaware) across the country will ring in the new year by raising their minimum wage on Jan. 1, 2024. New York and New Jersey will reach a statewide minimum wage of \$15 on New Year's Day, with Maryland and Delaware reaching \$15 per hour by January 2025. Use your voice and ballot to support issues you believe in.

We have seen in Pennsylvania and across the country **school board directors** considering policies such as book banning, limits on transgender students, curriculum reviews, censorship activity, and discriminatory policies and practices. As our friends in the AAUW Doylestown branch found out, we must pay attention to school boards so we can speak against such extremist policies.

We need your help to monitor school board activity. While most of our members reside in the Carlisle Area School District, we do have members in Cumberland Valley, Big Spring, South Middleton, West Shore, Mechanicsburg, Lebanon, and Northern York County school districts. We would like two or three persons "assigned" to each district to be responsible for monitoring the activity at the school board meetings. This would involve monitoring the district website, board meeting agendas, board meeting minutes, newspaper articles, and attending meetings (as necessary) in person or remotely. AAUW Pennsylvania is working with a new coalition, Pennsylvanians for Welcoming and Inclusive Schools (PAWInS), to create effective strategies to challenge extremist use of school board power and legislative policies. If you become aware of an issue in your school district, we will reach out to this organization and AAUW Pennsylvania for guidance on our advocacy efforts. How Has AAUW Changed Your Life? Stories from Our Membership

In honor of our branch's 100th anniversary, we asked **Beth Bullard**, 1979-80 AAUW Dissertation Fellowship recipient, to talk about the impact AAUW has had on her life. Beth wrote...

In 1976, at age 38, I already knew the subject of research for my dissertation for a doctorate in Music History and Theory from the University of Pennsylvania. My goal was to set right the scanty and faulty information that was being promulgated by music historians about a charmingly illustrated little book printed in 1511 in the city of Basel, Switzerland. To accomplish my goal of bringing to light the actual content of this important historical document, I would have to juggle several identities: being (1) a mother of two teen-age sons, (2) an instructor of Applied Flute, Chamber Music, and courses in Music History at Dickinson College, (3) a performing flutist, and (4) a lover and researcher of a then secondary but eventually a primary subject of my academic interests: Music of India. Some things would have to go.

As I searched for fellowships in order to support my work on the dissertation while I took a break from other pursuits (not including mothering)—lucrative as well as non-paying—I found only a few that might count my life path to date as compatible with their expectations. Most fellowships at that time were largely tailored to the life timelines of men, not women. This is essentially where being awarded an AAUW dissertation fellowship changed my life.

My goals, my dreams, my pursuits, my life stage and trajectory at the time, my then status as a mother as well as a student, my accomplishments to date—all these were taken seriously, even celebrated. It was OK to be me, and it was OK to be a woman! I was so thankful to AAUW that my first act when I again earned a paycheck (though very modest) was to become a life member of the organization that had helped me so very much.

In the 1990s, I was able to pursue my love of Indian music and culture, leading to my earning a second doctorate, this one in Ethnomusicology, with India as my primary field (and Renaissance Europe, organology [study of musical instruments], and music and gender as three secondary fields). I also gave a presentation on my project in India at a Carlisle AAUW meeting. I was honored in 2007 by being selected to serve on the AAUW panel that awards AAUW dissertation fellowships. I was very pleased to be able to give back to the AAUW in this capacity for three years. It was time for me to help other women have their lives profoundly changed and enhanced by the American Association of University Women in the same way that it had done so for me nearly three decades earlier.

Tour Carlisle's Historic Courthouse & Old Public Graveyard "High Above and Six Feet Under?" Friday, April 12, 1:30 pm



The **Program Committee** plans speakers for branch meetings, as well as the December brunch, the February luncheon, and the Scholarship Banquet in April.

The Committee meets no later than April to brainstorm topics and possible speakers and to develop a theme for the programs of the year. This year's theme was "Our 100th Anniversary" and last year's was "Right in Our Own Backyard," focusing on local projects that impact women and girls. In the weeks after the initial meeting, committee members contact possible speakers with meeting dates and locations and try to get confirmations to add to the worksheet managed by one of the Program Vice Presidents. Ultimately, this worksheet is submitted for publication in our annual Yearbook.

The Committee member who contacts the speaker and gets confirmation then becomes the Chair of that particular meeting, and will communicate directly with the speaker. About two months before the meeting, the Chair reaches out to the speaker for biographical information for a newsletter article. The Chair will introduce the speaker at the meeting and present a thank you note and gift certificate at the end of the meeting.

Program Vice Presidents coordinate dates, send reminders and requests to Program Chairs, arrange Audio-Visual Equipment, and schedule Hospitality Volunteers.

Strong Program Committees are responsible for AAUW Carlisle's excellent speakers and programs. As the adage goes, "Many hands make light work." Our Program Committees have been the perfect illustration of that idea. We hope you can join us.
