One of the things I am proudest of is that our branch doesn't shy away from doing big things. Ironically, some things that we plan can become much bigger than we anticipated, like this CASD School Board Candidate Forum.

We have earned the reputation in the community, along with the League of Women Voters of the Pennsylvania Capitol Region, of being non-partisan advocates for voter education



and have held these forums for a number of years. Usually, there were about six or seven candidates, and we were pleased when 50 voters attended.

This year, we decided to try something new and live-stream the forum from Carlisle High School. We reserved the LGI classroom with a capacity of 60. Oh, how naive we were! We underestimated the interest in this year's election.

Ten candidates have joined together to form two opposing teams with different perspectives. That created some unique challenges in gaining the trust of both sides that our questions and format would be fair. In the end, all ten agreed to participate.

We quickly learned that the sixty-seat capacity was nowhere near enough. Superintendent Colleen Friend and her staff went above and beyond to make the McGowan Auditorium available. In the end, we had 330 registrations, and another 100 watched the livestream. The feedback from candidates after the forum was universally positive.

# AAUW Carlisle 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration Esther Propel Shaw, Early Civil Rights Activist

Although she was not a member of AAUW Carlisle, Esther Propel has a strong connection to Dickinson College and helped integrate the AAUW Washington, D.C. branch. A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Dickinson College in 1919, she never spent a single night on campus. As an African American, she was not allowed to live in the Dickinson dormitories and had to commute from her home in Harrisburg. She was the first African-American woman to graduate from Dickinson. After college, Esther moved to Washington, D.C., and spent most of her adult life there. She married Andrew Shaw in 1925 and found employment in the segregated Washington, D.C. public school system. She taught middle schoolers languages, algebra, and penmanship until she retired in 1952.



Esther Propel Shaw saw the disparity between our country's stated values and the reality of life for African Americans. She became active in the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and the National Urban League. She wrote poetry and essays about these disparities and

frequently contributed to NAACP and Urban League publications. In response to a lynching in nearby Maryland, Propel penned her most famous poem, *Flag Salute*. She juxtaposed the story of the lynching with the words of the pledge to the American flag. *Flag Salute* was printed in the NAACP journal in 1934 and then reprinted on its cover in 1940.

A creative group of Washington writers formed an African-American literary society, and Esther Propel joined them. The Dickinson photo archives show her dancing at a small party honoring leading African-American poet Langston Hughes 'birthday. Most anthologies of Harlem Renaissance writings list Propel's name and poems, including *Flag Salute*, in their collections.

White American women joined the American Association of University Women, while their African-American counterparts joined the National Association of College Women. AAUW's national bylaws listed education as their only stated membership requirement, but there were few African-American women in AAUW during the 1940's. Segregation was written into the bylaws of many local branches, including the Washington, D.C. branch.

Suffragist and civil rights activist Mary Church Terrell forced the issue in 1946. She had earlier been a member of AAUW but let her membership lapse. She applied for reinstatement to the Washington, D.C. branch. Her credentials were impeccable: She held a B.A. and an M.A. from Oberlin, studied abroad for two years, and taught at Wilberforce University and in the Washington D.C. high schools. The D.C. branch turned down her membership request strictly based on her race.

AAUW National took the position that their by-laws governed all local chapters, while the D.C. chapter claimed local autonomy. The fight was played out in the courts and at the AAUW national conventions from 1946 to 1949, and in 1954, the Washington D.C. branch was integrated.

In 1955, Dickinson College surveyed its graduates, and Esther Propel Shaw proudly listed membership in the Washington, D.C. branch, AAUW, and the National Association of College Women in her answer to this question. Dickinson College now houses the Propel Shaw Center for Race and Ethnicity.
