This month, AAUW Carlisle is honored to welcome Emily Schmidt, Founder and Director of Missions and owner of The Cracked Pot, a faith-based, non-profit coffee shop.

At a young age, Emily dreamed of opening a coffee shop. That dream stayed with her as she married and raised three children. While she and her husband considered adoption, Emily was deeply moved by the staggering number of young adults aging out of the foster care system without a permanent family or a future plan.

After much prayer, planning, and patience, Emily opened The Cracked Pot—a unique coffee shop that serves more than just coffee. It partners with foster youth transitioning out of the system, offering them a place of stability, purpose, and hope. Emily's presentation will highlight the challenges faced by young people aging out of

foster care, and how communities like ours can come together to support them in meaningful ways. Her story is one of faith, compassion, and action—and promises to inspire.

Each recipient discussed her plans for the future. A common theme emerged as each of the students expressed her gratitude, not only for financial support, but for a sense of validation and belonging that AAUW scholarship recognition represents.

Leah Allewelt attends Penn State University where she majors in Veterinary and Biomedical Sciences. Leah hopes to become a veterinarian. She received the dedicated scholarship awarded to a resident of Perry County underwritten by an AAUW member who lives in Perry County.

Dinela Dedic is a student at Dickinson College where she majors in Environmental Science with a concentration in Food Studies and a minor in Art. Dinela is committed to being part of the Carlisle community's peaceful, secure, and colorful future. She is committed to the goals of energy sovereignty and climate action.

Parmilla Dhimal is a student at Penn State Harrisburg, majoring in Bio-Behavioral Health with plans to continue her studies in Public Health and, ultimately, attend Medical School. 

The **Marjorie M. Mowery Scholarship** honors Marjie's longtime involvement and leadership in AAUW both locally and statewide. A member for nearly forty years, Marjie served three two-year terms as President, was Finance Officer, and published our Branching Out newsletter. In the Carlisle community, Marjie was active with the Bosler Library, the Carlisle YWCA, the United Way, the First United Church of Christ, and the League of Women Voters.

The **Boytim-Rambo Scholarship** is named first for Joan Boytim, internationally acclaimed vocal instructor who received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Association of Teachers of Singers and an Outstanding Alumna award from Indiana University of Pennsylvania. The Scholarship is also named for Sylvia Rambo, a lawyer and federal judge, named to the Middle District of Pennsylvania by Jimmy Carter. She was honored when the federal courthouse in Harrisburg was named for her. Both these exceptional women were devoted to mentoring students.

Honoring AAUW Trailblazer Students

AAUW Carlisle held its 7th annual Trailblazers Girls' Recognition event on Wednesday, March 12, to honor students pursuing career and technical education fields of study. Trailblazer honorees are selected by their CTE teachers based on good citizenship at school, enthusiasm for their CTE program, and GPA.

The Trailblazer Award celebrates high school girls who choose vocational or technical fields of study. AAUW Carlisle created the Trailblazer Award in 2019 because the organization recognizes that girls who are interested in these pathways in high school may not otherwise receive positive support or recognition.

Following opening remarks by Mary France and Gail D'Urso, the honorees were introduced by members of the Trailblazer Committee: Barb Attivo, Gail D'Urso, Mary France, and Lillian Wong. Committee member Carolyn Freberg was unable to attend. Our honorees for 2025 are:

We will dearly miss these amazing young women and men and can't wait to collaborate with the new leadership team!


