Support the Branch's STEM initiative through volunteer opportunities with Junior Achievement's STEM program. Volunteers lead detailed, scripted activities with a small group of ninth-grade students for about 30-minute periods during the school day. The day consists of multiple rotations for the activity. Additionally, volunteers can access videos explaining and modeling the actual activity prior to the actual day. Also, hands-on training is provided before the students arrive. Background knowledge is NOT needed, rather a willingness to work with a group of students who find the day as a break from the routine.




